The restoration of a rail link between Oxford and Cambridge has been on the cards for nearly 20 years and the current project has been under way since 2015 with the route selection process still not completed some six years on.

In January 2020, East West Rail (EWR) announced the completion of a process to select a final 'corridor' of routes, with 'Route E' chosen. EWR said a further consultation would need to take place later in 2020 for final options.

Two months ago, EWR issued a statement proclaiming "£760m commitment to support next phase of East West Rail." adding of this public money that "The investment means further vital construction work can begin and represents an important milestone in the East West Rail project. The funding is for part of the line between Oxford and Bletchley/Milton Keynes and means this section of East West Rail is expected to be up and running by 2025".

At the time we pointed out the section between Bedford and Cambridge which EWR had originally hoped to have up and running by 2027 had been merely referred to much later on as 'Connection Stage Three: Oxford to Cambridge' with no information on likely funding or dates.

EWR has now formally announced a public consultation on the final route options between Bedford and Cambridge. At least one of these would result in major impact for Tempsford.


It seems EWR was listening. It has now announced a new consultation which started on 31st March and runs for 10 weeks until 9th June.

The key highlights are overleaf:-

- A series of possible routes between Bedford and Cambridge all of which follow the A428 east of St Neots.
- New stations near Tempsford or St Neots in the west and Cambourne in the east.
- EWR have a preference for Cambourne North in the west but has no preference in the east for either Tempsford or St Neots South.

A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet improvements

Development Consent Order application is being submitted by Highways England for this major project to proceed after all the investigative work and consultation has been completed.

A formal and final **Community Forum** meeting following the submission of the application was held on April 27th

A planning application for an archaeological dig at Tempsford has been approved ahead of this potential major road project. The site is agricultural grassland reached via a private road leading off Station Road. The area being investigated is where a large bridge will be built as part of the new route.

The approval allows for a site compound with 15 portable buildings and 30 parking spaces for archaeologists and site operatives throughout the excavation period. The works are anticipated to last for a period of nine months. Access to the site will be through Station Road, Tempsford and over the railway line at the level crossing.

Tempsford Parish Council responded to the application with a written objection, and attended the CBC's Development Management Committee meeting to pursue the matter. The Council had no objection to the work itself, in fact it would be quite interested in what is found, but questioned the chosen route for reaching the site.

It objected to the huge increase in traffic and noise on Station Road whilst the work was in progress, the danger of the roads either side of the railway line being blocked, and a lack of a plan to put the site back to its original condition. The Parish Council described the difficulty of having extra traffic travelling along Station Road. It will be the artery for the heavy traffic delivering cabins as well as everyday works traffic of 30 -40 vehicles. and suggested an alternative from Everton Road going across private land. Highways England countered by saying that this would cause many more difficulties and objections.

Acting agent on behalf of Highways England Chloe Evans said: "The proposal ensures suitable archaeological investigation is undertaken

and ensures items of historic interest aren't lost and are appropriately recorded for the future. It will identify and record the extent of Iron Age and Roman occupation activity in that area, as part of the infrastructure scheme for the A428 upgrade. Temporary structures will be removed to ensure the long-term character and should the A428 scheme not proceed the site will be reinstated to its current condition. the number of daily journeys will be reduced to 26."

Nearby resident Joe Lawrence described it as "a ruse", saying: "We're going to have a new railway station and a new road. "This is all premeditated to have a big market town. I'm against any of this. I don't want a massive town dumped on my doorstep. "Why don't we put nature before people?" he asked. "This won't be the new Milton Keynes for Bedfordshire on my watch."



PARISH COUNCIL MEETING NOTES

The following is a summary of the main points of discussion at the Parish Council meeting held on the 18th January 2021. This was a virtual meeting via Microsoft Teams. Full copies of the Minutes are available on the village website www.tempsford.org or from The Clerk.

Present: 6 Councillors, 1 CBC Councillor (Adam Zerny) Clerk and a member of the public.

Apologies: Apology received from Cllr. Bettles. **Declarations of Interest:** None were received.

Acceptance of Minutes: Minutes of the meeting held on the 18th January 2021 (Virtual) was approved and will be signed by the Chairman at a later date.

Public Session: A member of the public wanted to talk about the amount of litter in the village having spent a couple of weekends litter picking in the village and on the link road. He asked if signs could be put on the link road, saying "Thank you for keeping Tempsford tidy or Keep Britain Tidy". The Council agreed to investigate this. The Council thanked the resident for taking the trouble to do this task. The rabbit problem at Church End playing field was being dealt with by CBC. The resident also asked if he could put signs up near the playing field from sponsors repairing and making the football pitch playable. This was agreed.

Finance: The Clerk presented an invoice for approval of payments, and gave an update of the bank account and reconciliation. The accounts are being prepared for internal audit.

CBC: Cllr. Zerny had spoke earlier in the public session and had nothing more to report. However, if his support is needed for anything, please contact him.

Police: The Clerk read out a report from the Co-ordinator of Speed Watch. All Speed Watch activities are currently suspended during lockdown, but there is no definite date for things to restart. Police will prioritise groups where training is yet to take place. This includes Tempsford as we need equipment training. Online training has been completed.

There seems to be more suspicious behaviour near the Millennium Garden again. Clerk to contact Community Partnership again.

Planning: Neighbourhood Plan – The Clerk read out a report received from the NP Committee – the plan has been written and is ready to present to all the regulation 14 statutory consultees. They are currently in the process of building a website to upload the plan, character assessment and evidence-based documentation. Once this is completed, they will direct the statutory consultees to the site to review and feedback on the plan for a 6-week period. Following this and any amendments they need to make, they will be in a position to communicate the plan to the Tempsford Community for their approval over another 6-week period. They also need to elect an external examiner to approve the plan. Other than the final referendum they should have everything ready by August.

Archaeological Dig – West Hills Farm. – Response from meeting with Highways England held recently and recent emails. The alternative route was investigated that was suggested by the PC, but it was not possible. They also investigated the train times etc., for the level crossing, but they could not find definite information for the level crossing opening. Councillors did not want to stop the dig but concerned about traffic in Station Road and get held up at the level crossing. PC will not withdraw opposition to application, until sufficient evidence is supplied dealing with our concerns for our parishioners.

Highways: Chairman reported some potholes had been filled in, and other road works are being attended to over the next few weeks.

Turning point Station Road – people are still parking there, thereby blocking the bus from turning which was the whole idea of having it there. Decision – to contact CBC asking for sign to be erected and to remind all houses opposite asking not to park in turning area.

Charity Land – the Secretary had written to Highways England concerning the possible use of this land for the A421 development but has yet has not heard from them.

Flood Tool Kit: The Clerk had received information regarding the tool kit and what could be included. The Council will consider what could be needed and where it could be kept. The Clerk reminded the Parish Council that Moggerhanger Parish Council had contacted them wanting to form an action group concerning Anglian Water's management of flooding and sewage problems.

Play Area: **Tree Grant -** The website application form for the grant for trees was quite extensive. For the small amount we would possibly need in the Orchard at Gannock Castle area, we could consider buying them ourselves. The Grant is available until March 2022.

Church yard The large tree in corner of the church yard has bits falling off that are dead, - it needs to be taken down before falling down. Decision – to a get contractor to take it down (Clerk to get quotes)

Cemetery – Some graves have planting on them, even though they have a headstone, which is against our regulations. Owners to be contacted to flatten the earth and grass it for ease of cutting. Woodfines – Letter re cemetery land area not on Land Registry. Clerk to instruct Woodfines to inform LR that it is Parish Council land.


Next meeting – Monday May 10th, 2021 (Virtual) this will be the Annual Meeting. There will be no Annual Parish Meeting in April.

FORECASTING THE WEATHER - THE COUNTRY WAY

Weather forecasting today is highly sophisticated. Meteorologists use computers satellites, and weather balloons amongst many other types of equipment to compile their forecasts. However although the weather-forecasters now have this down to a precise science it is still really interesting to look at old fashioned folklore as sometimes it seems to predict what will happen really well.

At this time of the year for example, we often wonder what the summer will bring. It is often said that when the blackthorn is out in late April then the weather will usually be cold, and is referred to as a blackthorn winter.





Farming folk would say that we will have "no settled warm weather until the cowslips are finished". Then of course there's the "ne'er cast a clout 'til May be out." Is this referring to the end of the month of May, or to the blossoming of the hawthorn? Which do you think?

Referring to the trees coming into leaf the saying is:

"If the oak is out before the ash,
you're liable to get a splash
But if the ash is out before the oak,
then you're liable to get a soak!"

Start looking now to see what the trees in Tempsford are doing and make your predictions!

Do you know these about birds? When the robin sings from the roof tops or tops of trees it's a good sign, but if he sings lower down then it will rain, and the same is true of blackbirds. Swallows seen flying high, following insects on which they feed are a sign of good weather, but remember, one swallow doesn't make a summer!

Bees are often a good indicator of weather: "A swarm of bees in May brings a load of hay; A swarm of bees in June is worth a silver spoon But a swarm of bees in July isn't worth a fly!"

And finally concerning the time of year: "If it rains on Easter Day there will be good grass but bad hay." (meaning hay time will be wet, - a wet June) Easter was lovely and fine this year. If St Vitus Day (June 15th) be rainy weather it will rain for 30 days together.

It will be interesting to see how accurate these are this year. Do you know of any others? Happy weather watching!

STUART MEMORIAL HALL

I looked at my Tempsford Times article for this time last year and I was reporting that the Hall had just closed down because of the Covid -19 lockdown. This year, I'm pleased to be reporting that the Hall will re-open on the 17th May, subject to the Government sticking with Step 3 of its timetable for relaxing Covid rules. Please note that certain restrictions will still be in place.

Indoor sports activities, including exercise classes are allowed but these must operate under the 'rule of six', ie. that groups of up to 6 (or two households) can exercise together. More than one group of 6 can exercise as long as the groups are socially distanced and there must be no mingling between groups. Wedding receptions, funeral wakes and christening parties can take place subject to a maximum of 30 people. The 30 does not include catering staff. Discos and dancing are still not permitted. The Hall will be thoroughly cleaned and sanitised before re-opening and will be sanitised after every event. If you wish to hire the Hall between May 17th and June 21st, when Stage 4 of the Government timetable occurs, please contact our bookings secretary, Linda Collins (tempsfordsmh@yahoo.com) who will be able to provide guidance on what is and isn't allowed.

We have continued with our programme of maintenance and our new supplementary electric heaters have been installed in the Main Hall, Committee Room and Museum. These replace the old heaters which were removed last year when the Hall was redecorated. We therefore now have a backup heating system should the main oil boiler fail. The electric heating was paid for with our Community Asset Grant from Central Bedfordshire Council.

We have just received notification of a new grant of £1000 from the Tesco 'Bags of Help' scheme. We have a queue of projects that we still want to do and the Hall Committee will decide which one is best suited to spend this money.

Although, in theory, we are allowed to hold our AGM after May 17th, we feel that people may feel uncomfortable in coming to such a gathering so soon after restrictions are lifted. It is most likely therefore

that we will set a date in July after Stage 4 of the Government's plan. As I reported last time, we hope to run a Tempsford Show on Saturday, September 4th but we will not make a final decision on this until June and, if we go ahead, we will publish details, including the Show classes in the July edition of the Tempsford Times. Our ability to run the show will also depend on how our normal volunteers feel about helping this year.

We hope very much that, this time, the Hall will remain open permanently and will not be subject to further lockdowns. We wish to extend a warm welcome to our returning community and customers and to new people who wish to use the Hall. I'm told that bookings are going well and so, if you're planning an event, get your booking in soon.

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

We are also looking forward to meeting the nephew of the late Bill Simms, who farmed at Woodbury Low Farm for over 40 years. His nephew Martin has kept all his uncle's items associated with Tempsford and will deposit them with the Tempsford Museum for adding to our archives.

The Tempsford Museum and Archives like most places, has had to close its doors since March 2020 and this has obviously been a financial burden on us, just the same as everyone else. Thankfully our members of the "Friends of Tempsford Museum" have continued to help, by re-joining, even though we have been closed. We send them our sincere thanks for their support over this difficult period. Our Secretary Linda Collins has been tirelessly looking into any grants that may be available to help as well and made applications for two separate grants. Both were unsuccessful as we did not fit the criteria. However, undeterred she tried another with Central Bedfordshire Council, who thought we were worthy of support and awarded us a healthy grant to help us through this crisis period and beyond. Our sincere thanks to CBC for their support.
