


The turnout was 41% of an electorate of 465.



#### STOP PRESS EAST-WEST RAIL UPDATE ANNOUNCEMENT

Today, we're publishing the route update for East West Rail (EWR), which will see new train services connecting Oxford, Milton Keynes and Cambridge moving one step closer .

Having established that Alignment 1 performs better than Alignment 9, but that a station at Tempsford is expected to perform better than a station at St Neots, we developed a local variation of Alignment 1 between Colesden



and Little Barford to enable delivery of a station at Tempsford. The varied section is shown by the red line on the plan. We refer to the route which incorporates this variation as Alignment 1 (Tempsford variant). This is approximately 1km longer than Alignment 1 and would pass north of Ravensden and Roxton, south of St Neots, and between Roxton to the south and Black Cat Junction to the north. The alignment would then cross over the ECML at an approximate location similar to the Tempsford Option A station location, before continuing on the same route as Alignment 9.

In the coming weeks we are holding public information events and meeting stakeholders across the route to answer questions about the updates.

The event in Tempsford will be held in the Stuart Memorial Hall on July 7th from 2pm to 8pm



Our next exhibition will be on Sunday June 4<sup>th</sup> 2023 , from 2pm to 4pm Our exhibition will be <u>RAF Tempsford.</u>

This theme continues on <u>Saturday July 1<sup>st</sup> and</u> <u>Sunday July 2<sup>nd</sup></u> when the Tempsford Museum and Archives joins with the Tempsford Veterans and Relatives Association for a two day Armed Forces Event.

This will be a great opportunity for everyone to learn all about what went on at RAF Tempsford during WW2.

There will also be the Army, Navy and Air Force represented, together with six speakers over the two days, an SOE Living History Group, Army Obstacle Course, an RAF Flight Simulator, and several associated stalls, tea room, bar and food outlets, a singer of 1940s war time melodies and much more.

Paul Salmon from Highways England was a guest speaker at the Annual Parish Meeting on April 25th when he spoke about their hopes for the eventual freedom to begin work on the A428/A421 extension. We have received this most recent update from Paul.

I personally wanted to give you a further update on where we are with the legal challenge against the A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet scheme.

On Thursday 18 May, the Court of Appeal refused Transport Action Network's (TAN) application to appeal the refusal of permission for a judicial review of the Secretary of State's decision to grant the A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet improvements a Development Consent Order (formal planning permission).

We are pleased to say this means that the legal process is now over, and we can start working towards full construction. However, the legal challenge has disrupted our construction timetable and the start of work has been delayed.

We are keen to get started as soon as possible so you will see us continue preparatory works including archaeology, environmental surveys, and diverting utilities as we get ready for full construction.

We are continuing to work closely with local authorities, parish councils, and community groups to ensure that there is minimum

#### SUMMARY of the ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 25th April 2023

held in the Stuart Memorial Hall.

This is a shortened summary of the meeting, most of the details presented at this meeting have already been recorded in Tempsford Times throughout the year Full approved Minutes will be available on <u>www.tempsford.org</u> or from the Clerk when approved.

**Present** – 6 Councillors, apologies from Cllr. Goddard, 1 CBC Councillor, 6 Residents and Speakers from Anglian Water and National Highways.

**Cllr.David Sutton** the Parish Council Chairman, welcomed everyone meeting. The Minutes of the last APM dated 26<sup>th</sup> April 2022 – were approved and all actions had been carried out by the Parish Council. He gave a presentation of the Parish Council's work during the last year, and how it is funded by the Precept.

**CBC Councillor Tracey Wye** thanked the residents of Tempsford for the past 4 years support and summarised work she had done on behalf of Tempsford with regard to roads and pavements, to retain the Wheatsheaf pub and work on the planning committee and licensing..

**Secretary of Tempsford Charities** Councillor Simon Fraser, revisited the fact that the Charities give modest grants for something that a person may need, as well as training, development in their careers.

**Rev Graham Buckle** Rector St Peter's Church thanked everyone for all the help that is given at the moment particularly as funds are needed to keep it functioning.

**Stephen Gosling** reported that the Methodist Chapel in Station Road is closing and would encourage as many as possible to attend its last service on Sunday 25th June at 6pm

**Steve Cooney** gave a survey of the items that Tempsford Museum and Archives has received through this year, and of the visitors they have had, particularly from other local Historical Societies. He thanked everyone that supports the work of the Museum as they celebrate their 10th Anniversary this year.

**T-MUG Groups:** Several groups have been formed and meet regularly: Book Club, Crafters. Walkers and Beer Appreciation. Activities are advertised in the Tempsford Times

**Brian Harrison** Stuart Memorial Hall Chairman, reported that bookings are almost back to pre-covid levels, and that by using grants received the hall is now is very fine condition. Future events such as The Tempsford Show, a Murder Mystery event, and an Adult Panto are all planned, and he encouraged the community to make full use of the hall.

**Joe Lawrence** Tempsford Football Club Chairman said that they have gained players from other clubs that have folded. Their aim is to get more local people playing in the team and their dream is still to have an actual pitch in the village.

#### From National Highways – Paul Salmon

National Highways were asked to attend to give an update on the A421. Firstly, he spoke about the replacement of the central reservation on the A1. This is due to finish in June 2023. The 40mph is for the safety of workers and to make people slow down especially where there are no barriers. An operative was nearly injured, so reason for slow speed. National Highways are the stakeholders of the A421/A428 Black Cat extension Brochures were handed out. Describing the work and final route There has been a legal challenge against the Secretary of State, it has been to court twice and this is holding up the progress. They are doing a lot of archaeological digging etc. There is 92% support for the scheme. Hopefully the project will start December 2023 – Jan 2024.

Questions asked: - 1) Impact on the village – housing! **Answer** – we are not building roads to facilitate housing, but the Government has made it as such. 2) When construction starts some construction traffic will come down Station Road. **Answer** – there will not be a huge amount and they will work with the residents. A comment was made that open dialogue at all times helps to keep fears and worries at bay.

The Highways said that they would be happy to come along with their mobile van to the village show in September, which would enable people to come and talk to them.

#### From Anglian Water – Mr. Blackshaw

Further upgrades have been done in Station Road, there has been an erosion of concrete pipes. A lot of groundwater recently. It has not been too bad lately. **Question** – 1) When will you draw a line on how many houses should be on the sewer towards Tempsford. Too many houses being put up in Blunham and Great Barford. **Answer** – they try and work with the builders. It does not always work. 2) Why have they not followed the idea of taking the pipe across the field away from Tempsford to the sewage plant? There had been flooding in Sawford Meadows and it smells awful. **Answer** – They were not aware that this was an option to take the pipes across the field.

General discussion on surface water and the fact now that the pump had been changed in Station Road, it had no real concerns now. It was mentioned that the drinking water pressure was low.

Gravel extraction behind Church Street – they had no news on this only that they were surveying in case they can get gravel from there. The Chairman asked that they take away the questions that had been asked and look into them and perhaps get back to the Parish Council.

The meeting closed at 21.40 hours and everyone was offered refreshments and people stayed and chatted about various topics.

#### **Annual Meetings**

Like most organizations, the church holds an annual meeting where you can hear reports about the church and what has happened during the previous year; the rules and regulations say that this must happen each year and each year the date of the meeting is publicised. The four churches of which I am Rector all have their own separate annual meetings. As I write this, three out of the four churches have held their annual meetings for this year. We have heard reports on the fabric of the church and our mission. We have also elected new members to the Parochial Church Councils and Churchwardens and also this year representatives to the Deanery Synod who are elected every three years.

Part of the meeting deals with the financial standing of the church. Like everyone else our energy costs have risen, and we have had to be more aware of how we use our resources although we try to maintain a warm building for people to come and worship, and when attending other events. As we tackle these rising costs, we are having to dig into our reserves, and in most cases we are running at a deficit.

One of the ways to help in maintaining our churches in the benefice is to donate on a monthly basis through setting up a standing order directly payable to the church of your commu-








Time has flown by since the last update, in which time both teams have ended the season 2022/23.
